REFERENCE:

The Secretary-General of the United Nations presents his compliments to the Permanent Representatives of Member States and to the Permanent Observers of Non-Member States to the United Nations and has the honour to refer to the Convention on the Prohibition of the Use, Stockpiling, Production and Transfer of Anti-personnel Mines and on Their Destruction (APLC), which entered into force on 1 March 1999.

Article 12, paragraph 1, of the Convention states that a "Review Conference shall be convened by the Secretary-General of the United Nations five years after the entry into force of this Convention. Further Review Conferences shall be convened by the Secretary-General of the United Nations if so requested by one or more States Parties, provided that the interval between Review Conferences shall in no case be less than five years. All States Parties to this Convention shall be invited to each Review Conference".

In accordance with the decision taken by the Third Review Conference of the States Parties to the Convention (23 to 27 June 2014, Maputo, Mozambique), as contained in paragraph 31of the Final Report of the Conference (APLC/CONF/2014/4), the Fourth Review Conference will be held at the end of 2019.

In accordance with the decision taken by the Seventeenth Meeting of the States Parties to the Convention (26 to 30 November 2018, Geneva, Switzerland), the Fourth Review Conference will take place during the week of 25 to 29 November 2019 in Oslo, Norway. The Meeting further decided to hold preparatory meetings in advance of the Fourth Review Conference in Geneva on 24 May and on 18 September 2019.

Furthermore, the General Assembly, in paragraph 10 of its resolution 73/61 of 5 December 2018:

"Requests the Secretary-General, in accordance with article 12, paragraph 1, of the Convention, to undertake the preparations necessary to convene the Fourth Review Conference of the States Parties to the Convention and, on behalf of the States parties and in accordance with article 12, paragraph 3, of the Convention, to invite States not parties to the Convention, as well as the United Nations, other relevant international organizations or institutions, regional organizations, the International Committee of the Red Cross and relevant non-governmental organizations, to attend the Fourth Review Conference as observers".

In accordance with these provisions, the Secretary-General has the honour to convene the Fourth Review Conference of the States Parties to the Convention. This Conference will be held from 25 to 29 November 2019 in Oslo, Norway. The first and the second preparatory meetings in advance of the Fourth Review Conference will take place in Geneva on 24 May and 18 September, respectively.

The Secretary-General also has the honour, on behalf of the States Parties, to invite the States not parties to the Convention to participate in the Review Conference as observers.

The Secretary-General takes this opportunity to recall that article 14, paragraph 1, of the Convention provides, inter alia, as follows:

"The costs of [...] the Review Conferences [...] shall be borne by the States Parties and States not parties to this Convention participating therein, in accordance with the United Nations scale of assessment adjusted appropriately".
