COMMUNICATIONS RECEIVED RELATING TO DISARMAMENT

Note by the Secretary-General

I. INTRODUCTION

1. At its tenth special session, in 1978, the General Assembly requested the Secretariat to provide lists for general circulation, of the communications received from the organizations and institutions known to be conducting research in the field of disarmament. The lists were circulated under the symbol A/INF/S-10/1 and Add.1 and 2.

2. In paragraph 28 of its report to the General Assembly, 1/ the Preparatory Committee for the Second Special Session of the General Assembly Devoted to Disarmament recommended that non-governmental organizations concerned with disarmament and peace and disarmament research institutions should be accorded the same facilities at the second special session of the Assembly devoted to disarmament as those which they had received at the first special session.

3. At the 1st plenary meeting of its twelfth special session, on 7 June 1982, the General Assembly endorsed the report of the Preparatory Committee and the recommendations contained therein.

4. The present document contains a consolidated list 2/ of the communications concerning disarmament received from non-governmental organizations and research institutions. It also gives a reference to petitions submitted by groups of individuals. 3/
